## Proceedings of the City Council of the City of Peru.

Council Chamber, Peru, April 11th, 1860.

It appearing that the late city clerk, J. J. Dowling, has published a false and garbled statement of what he calls the "Proceedings of the City Councils on the 11th of April, 1860," to which he has signed his name, J. J. Dowling, city clerk, it is deemed proper that the true proceedings of that city council should be presented in order that the real state of facts may be made apparent, and the omissions and errors of that false record may be clearly presented to the public.

With a view to this object, we have prepared the following proceedings of the city council holden on the 11th of April, 1860, which we submit to the candor and fairness of our fellow citizens-and we are certain that the large number of citizens present on that occasion will vouch for the fidelity and accuracy of our report.

The council met pursuant to a special call by his Honor, the Mayor, for the purpose of canvassing the returns of the late municipal election.

Present, his Honor, the Mayor, P K. Behrend, and Aldermen Ream, of the 1st Ward, and Maze of the 2d Ward.

Naasson Young also occupied a seat at the table in the council.

On motion, the minutes of proceedings of the last council were read and

approved.
The Mayor then announced that the canvassing of the election returns for the different wards, to ascertain the result of the election, was now in order.

Whereupon Alderman Maze intro-duced the following resolution: Resolved, That the candidates of the late city election, holden on the 2d of April, 1860, who, by the returns of the judges of election, appear to have the highest number of votes, and in regard to whose election there is no contest, be now requested to qualify and the their seats as members of the city coun-

cil. Seconded by Alderman Ream.
Upon being put it was voted for affirmatively by aldermen Maze and Ream, and Mr. Young also voted affirmatively, whereupon the resolution was declared adopted.

The Mayor after declaring the adop-tion of the resolution inquired of Mr. Young if he considered himself still an acting member of the Board, remarking that he had notice that he had voted upon the passage of the resolution insteadants. olution just adopted

Mr. Young renlied that he supposed that he held his seat as alderman until his successor was elected and qualified.

To this the Mayor responded that he thought not but that from the reading of the city charter, he Mr. Young, having been elected for two years, his term of office expired by limitation on the first Monday of April 1860.

To which Mr. Young replied that he held his office until his successor

was elected and qualified.

Here Theron D. Brewster gave notice that he contested the election of Mr. McCormick as alderman for the long term in the 1st Ward on two grounds.

Mr. Brewster thereupon served a notice upon J. L. McCormick, of his design to contest his election, and the grounds upon which the contest was

Whereupon it appeared that J. L. McCormick received 85 votes, and Theron D. Brewster 80.

Wm. Scherzer received 84 votes for the short term, and A. L. Shepherd

J. L. McCormick from the bystanders; stated that the method adopted by the city council was usual in canvascanvassing the returns of the Mayor, and stated that when he was Mayor that was his way of doing business. Whereupon alderman Ream expressed an opinion that the returns for Mayor

should be canvassed first.

On motion Mr. Scherzer having the largest number of votes for alderman for the short term and there being no contest in regard to his election was declassed duly elected as alderman of the 1st Ward for the short term, which motion was carried, aldermen Maze and Ream and Mr. Young voting affirma-

atively. A motion was then made by Mr. Young, which was seconded, that John L. McCormick having received the unusual

largest number of votes for alderman for long term in 1st Ward be declared elected. Seconded by alderman Ream.

The Mayor declined to receive the motion on the ground that Mr. Young the mover, was not a member of the city council, and a motion from him could not properly be entertained (Mr. Young still persisting upon his right to act with the council) and the Mayor feeling the delicacy of his position, there being no copy of the city charter present asked Messrs. McCormick, Brewster, Kilduff and Cof.ng, who had been members of the city council, their recollection in regard to the practice about which the present question arose.

Captain McCormick in response to the case, stated that in his opinion Mr Young was entitled to act as alderman until his succe. For was elected and qualified. Messrs. Kilduff, Cronise, and others entertained similar yiews. Messrs. Brewster and Cofing being called upon differed from the others and agreed with the Mayor that the term of Mr. Young expired by limitation and that he was not qualified to act as alderman in the present city council. The debate because bitter, and the speak ers spoke with much feeling and under considerable excitement.

A copy of the city charter was produced and section 1st of article 4 and section 5 of article 2 was admitted fully to sustain the ruling of the mayor, It appearing no where in the charter that alder. In were authorized to retain their offices until their successors were elected and qualified.

The returns of the judges of election of the 2d Ward for alderman were then on motion canvassed and it appearing that Churchill Cotting received 66 votes, Wm. Paul 1.

For term not indicated Wm. B. Day received 41 votes, Wm Paul 44, and Churchill Coffing 3.

J. L. McCormick here presented his oath of qualification and demanded his seat.

Churchill Coffing asked of the city council and of the bystanders if his election was contested? It being replied no contest, he then presented his oath of qualification and took his seat without objection under the resolution adopted by the council determining its rule of proceeding.

rule of proceeding.

Mr. Young and alderman Ream expressed an opinion that the mayor should be qualified before newly elected aldermen. But as the resolution was explicit Mr. Coffing under its provisions took his place as alderman elect of the 2d Ward.

On motion the certified returns of

On motion the certified returns of the judges of election for the 3d Wardwere then canvassed and it appearing that R A Winston received for long term 48 votes, James Cummings 1. Bartholomew Danny 24.

For thort term, James Cummings received 16 votes, A T Hagan 39, Bartholomew Denny 7.

James Commings, no term indicated 24 votes.

It appearing that R. A. Winston had received the largest number of votes cast for alderman for long term, and A. T. Hagan for short term, they presented their oath of qualification and took their seats, under the resolution as alderman elect for the 3d Ward.

James Commings also presented his oath of qualification, in regard to which no action was had, as the council had decided upon the certified returns of the judges of election—there being no contest.

A motion that Mr. Commings be declared elected alderman of the 3d ward was lost by a large majority.

The returns of the 4th Ward having been called up, and it appearing from the reading of the recorded notice, viz:

On motion, it was ordered that the city council proceed to the election of

Whereupon, on motion, Herman Silver was nominated and, on motion, was declared elected by the following aldermen voting in favor: Maze,

Winston, Hagan, and Coffing; Alderman Ream voting against the mo-
