Supersedeas Bond -

Know all men by these presents, that we William Brady as principal, and Smith Frye as surety, are held and firmly bound unto Horace G. Anderson and John C. Proctor, in the penal sum of One Thousand Dollars, for the payment whereof, well and truly to be made, we bind ourselves, our heirs, executors and administrators, jointly and severally, firmly by these presents.

Witness our hands and seals at Peoria,
this 28th day of March A.D. 1860.

The condition of this obligation is such that whereas the said Horace G. Anderson and John C. Proctor, did, at the November Term A.D. 1859, of the Circuit Court within and for the County of Peoria, in the State of Illinois, recover by the consideration of said court, a judgment and decree in a certain proceeding for Mechanics Lien against the said William

Brady for the sum of Six Hundred and Ninety
Four Dollars and four cents, besides costs of
suit; and whereas The Honorable Pinckney
H. Walker, one of the justices of the Supreme
Court of the State of Illinois, in vacation,
to wit, on the 21st day of March A.D. 1860.
after inspecting a copy of the record of the
proceeding aforesaid, did order and allow
a writ of error to reverse the judgment and
decree aforesaid, to be made a supersedeas,
upon condition that the said William
Brady enter into bond in the penal sum
of One thousand dollars, with Smith Truys
security, conditioned according to law Now
therefore, provided the said William Brady
shall duly prosecute said writ of error, and
shall pay said judgment and decree and
all costs, interest, and damages, in case
said judgment and decree shall be affirm-
ed by the said Supreme Court, then
this obligation to be void, otherwise to re-
main in full force and effect.
