

Mules are subject to but few of the diseases which prevail. and are so destructive, among horses. Their hard skin and short hair render them less iiable to be galled by the harness or affected by cutaneous discases. They are said never to be infested by vermin. The hoof of the mule is essentially a horny substance, and of slow growth, and hence his shoes are seldom cast or displaced in the position, but remain until worn out firmly on the feet. The vision of the mule is much more quick and distinct than that of the horse, and therefore they are less liable to shy or become frightened. They are sure footed to a proverb. The mule excels the horse and emulates the ox in his steady and unijorm efforts in labor. 
