## LAID TO REST.

Funeral Obsequies at the Late Guvernet Gustavus Koerner.

The funeral of Gov. Gustavus Koerner took place at 10 o'clock a. m., Sunday, from the family residence on
Mascoutah avenud, to Walnut Hill
cemetery, and was sttended by a large
concourse of mourning-friends. The
services at the house were simple but
impressive and consisted of the singing
of a hymn, "Lead Kindly Light," by
the shoir of the First M. E. church,
which was fellowed by an eloquent
tribute delivered by the Hon. Jehu
Baker, a life-long friends of the deceased.

At the close of Mr. Baker's remarks, the casket was placed in the hearse by the pall-bearers, who were the six grand-sons of the deceased, Messrs. Victor, Gustavus, Kent and William M. Koerner, and Theodore and Edgar Rombauer.

The funeral cortege was a very long one. The members of the St. Clair County Bar, the city and county officials and the Board of Directors of the Public Library, attended in a body and marched to the cemetery.

At the cemetery after the easket had been placed over the grave, the Hon. Lyman Trumbull, of Chicago, an intimate and life-long friend of the departed, delivered an impressive address in which he feelingly spoke of the life-long friendship that had existed between himself and the deceased, and paid a growing tribute to his life and character, as a citizen, jurist, statesman and diplomta.

He was followed by Prof. F. J. Staufenbiel, the Librarian of the Public Library, who spoke eloquently, in the German language, of the virtues of his deceased friend, his devotion to litera ture and unselfish services in behalf of the public library, concluding, his remarks by depositing, in the name of the library board, a laurel wreath on the casket which contained all that was mortal of their departed president.
